

Returning to Pearl Harbor after a brief occupation duty in Tokyo Bay after WWII, USS Nevada BB-36 was surveyed and assigned as a target ship for the Bikini atomic experiments. The tough old veteran survived the atom-bomb test of July 1946, returned to Pearl Harbor to decommission 29 August, and was sunk by gunfire and aerial torpedoes off Hawaii 31 July 1948. Our featured Captain, Commander Willis Fisher was a member of Nevada's crew at this time.



Commenced disembarking 19 passengers.

Joe,

It was such a long time ago, that all I could tell you is that during the night some of the lookots stated that they had heard some shouts or voices. The next day is when we spotted the boat full of Cubans. Their were about 19 people in a small boat. We sent the whale boat out to investigate, before getting near them. Their boat seemed to be sinking from the weight and all of the water that it was taking. I started talking to them from afar to let them know that we were a U.S. Navy ship and for them not to do anything crazy or we would have to open fire on them. When we pulled them along side, I had to talk to them and instruct them as to how to come onboard.

I remember telling them to sit on the deck and Doc Segal and Griffin started to check them out. We gave them blankets, hot coffee and something to eat. I think it was Capt. Riggs who was the skipper at the time and Lt. Thomas, had me asking them questions as to where they came from (what area of Cuba they set off from). We separated the men from the women and children by taking the females and children below decks to the mess hall, however the men were left topside. I remember that we tied their small boat to the rear of the ship, however the ropes they had were not long enough and it started to sink their boat, so we tied their boat using our ropes so that we could tow it farther away from the wave that our props were making. I remember that they



had asked me if we could save their boat because it had saved their lives. I told the skipper and he gave the orders to tie their boat up that way.

I think we contacted the U.S. Coast Guard telling them that we had found some Cubans and gave them certain details. It was Lt. Thomas who later sat with me as we questioned them about Cuban Intelligence. We asked them for names of Cubans that were in the U.S. and worked for their Intell. as Agents. They told us about how the Cuban military had missiles and where they were located. We wrote it all up in the Intell reports that Lt. Thomas had to do. They spoke of the poor conditions in Cuba and how the Communist (Russians) where everywhere.

I remember that several of the men were fishermen. They mentioned that they had lost some fellow boat people and I think we looked for some other survivors however never found anyone. They kept saying how gratefull they were that we found them and would not return them to Cuba.

Joe I would think that you have access to some type of reports that were made on this incident. Remember that several of the guys took pictures and I seem to remember seeing some of them, however I don't remember who took them.

I had contacted Larry Thomas one of the OOD's during this incident. As you will see Larry could not recall what had happened, but after 46 years who could blame him. Larry explains how he came up with the following. - ed

Hi Joe,

I read Carlos' recollections, and they somewhat refresh my memory. I think Carlos is right about the refugees' boat leaking. That would account for our initial towing speed of 5 Knots and then eventually hoisting it on board. While I was technically OOD during most of the event, Carlos' info makes me believe that Captain Riggs may have either held the previous OOD, Bill Efird, over or had another officer fill in for me, and sent me to supervise security, while the refugees were on board. As Weapons Officer, I was also the ship's Nuclear Weapons Security Officer, since we were a nuclear capable ship with our ASROC. I'm sure we called out the Nuclear Weapons Security Response Team, to keep an eye on our guests. This may account for my surprise, when I saw I was OOD in the deck logs. I also now have some vague recollection of interrogating the

refugees, but after leaving ROAN, I served three tours with Naval Intelligence, with the last two as a Counter-intelligence Officer. So, I've interrogated a lot of possible spies and saboteurs and may well have my interrogations confused. Carlos may have me confused with John Slaven, who was the Ops Officer. Regarding their info that they had lost some fellow boat people, I believe that was a reference to other boat people, who had tried to escape from Cuba. As far as I recall, all personnel in their particular boat were accounted for, and there was no reference, in the deck logs, about any search.

I'll be interested in any recollections Bill Efird may have, as they may jar my memory, even more.

Larry Thomas LT 63-65

In the following Larry was gracious enough to interpret the deck logs from that moring. As you saw there was not a lot of apparent information in them. - ed

Hi Joe,

I got your package of ROAN logs and photos of the Cuban refugees event. I've reviewed the logs and photos, and neither has improved my recollection of the Cuban refugees event. I was rather shocked to see that I was actually the OOD during most of the event. I must be getting senile in my old age.

While my reviewing the logs and photos of the Cuban refugees event hasn't improved my recollection of same, I have put together a likely scenario of what happened, based on the logs and photos.

We were doing sonar testing with the USS THREAD-FIN (SS-410) off of Key West during the morning of Sunday, 2 February 1964. Bill Efird was OOD on the 04-08 Watch, and we were maneuvering at various courses and speeds as part of the test. At 0710, THREADFIN reported sighting a small boat ahead of our formation. At 0733, we terminated the exercise, and at 0734, proceeded to investigate the small boat, apparently in distress. I suspect that Bill had called the Captain, who probably ordered the sub to further check out the small boat, and based on a further report from the sub that the small boat appeared to be in distress, the Captain terminated the exercise and told Bill to set a course for the small boat. This would account for the 23 minutes between the initial sighting and our Captain's actions. I relieved Bill as OOD for the 08-12 Watch, and at 0805, we had the small boat along side to port. The log shows that the boat had 19 passengers, apparently in distress without gas and

with an inoperable engine. At 0810, we took the small boat under tow, and at 0824, set a course of 040, speed 5 knots. At 0925, we were lying to, to hoist the boat to starboard. At 1019, the boat was hoisted, and we set a course of 040, speed 5 knots. Between 1019 and 1032, we incrementally increased speed to 20 knots. At 1148, we rendezvoused with a Coast Guard boat, took her alongside to starboard, and commenced disembarking the 19 passengers. At 1202, we completed the transfer and set course to rejoin the THREADFIN.

While the log shows that we disembarked the 19 passengers onto a Coast Guard boat, it doesn't show when we actually embarked them. The photos show a fairly calm sea state, but with a mild chop. My guess is that we tried towing the small boat and passengers, hence the 5-knot speed. At 0925, we decided to hoist the small boat, and if the 19 passengers weren't already embarked, we would have certainly embarked them before hoisting their boat. I suspect that our decision to hoist the refugees' boat was based on the need to increase our speed from 5 knots to 20 knots, in order to shorten the time it would take to rendezvous with the nearest Coast Guard boat. While not clear from the log, I assume we also lowered their boat, and the Coast Guard took it in tow.

I've stayed in close touch with Charlie Wingo over the years. I think he was still on board at the time of the event, so I'm going to forward this to him, and if he was onboard and has anything to add, I send it to you. Larry Thomas

Dear Richard:

Thank you for the Fall 2011 Jolly Cholly newsletter. I am just learning about the USS C.H. Roan Association and found the newsletter to be very interesting. Reading the letters in the newsletter from former Roan crewmembers reminded me of why my time aboard the Roan has stuck with me all of these years. I had the privilege of serving with a lot of great guys, most of whom I haven't seen or heard of since leaving the ship in January 1964. I am glad to see that Dallas Reese (QM2 59-64) is involved in the Association. Although he probably doesn't remember me, he was a great help to me when I moved from the deck force to the bridge and was eventually recommended to go to Class A Quartermaster School on the base in Newport

Commander Willis Henry Fisher 4th Commanding Officer USS Charles H. Roan

4 JAN 1951 - 26 MAY 1952



Willis Henry Fisher was born in April, 1918 in Canton, Ohio. He graduated from Youngstown South High School in 1937 and attended Case Institute of Technology in Cleveland, Ohio for one year before being appointed to the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland.

The Naval Academy yearbook "The Lucky Bag" says about Willis Fisher, "A jolly Dutchman from Ohio describes him perfectly... Lucky will be those who are his future shipmates for his good humor, smiling face, and personality make him the friend of all."

Midshipman Fisher graduated from the Naval Academy and received his commission as an Ensign in February, 1941. His first assignment was with the USS New Mexico BB-40. The New Mexico was home ported at Pearl Harbor, in the Hawaiian Islands. In May of 1941 the New Mexico was sent to the Atlantic to meet the menace presented by German successes in Europe. New Mexico returned to the



Pacific in early 1942 to help reinforce a Pacific Fleet that had been badly crippled by the Japanese. During most of 1942 she operated off the U.S. west coast and in Hawaiian waters. While assigned to New Mexico Ensign Fisher was promoted to LTjg and then Lt.

In April, 1943 Lieutenant Fisher was transferred to the USS Cowpens CVL-25 (the Mighty MOO.) Being a member of her commissioning crew in May, 1943, made him a Plankowner.

The Cowpens arrived at Pearl Harbor in September, 1943 and in October sailed with TF 14 for the strike on Wake Island. In November she participated in strikes on the Gilbert Islands (Mille and Makin atolls) and in December strikes on the Marshall Islands (Kwajalien and Wotje.)

Joining TF 58 the Cowpens participated in the invasion of the Marshals again hitting Kwajalein and also Eniwetok in January, 1944. In February she joined in the attack on Truk and later in the attack on the Mariana Islands. During this period the USS Cowpens received the Navy Unit Commendation.

In May 1944 Lieutenant Fisher was transferred to the USS Flint CL-97. He was a member of her commissioning crew in August, 1944 and therefore a Plankowner. In January, 1945, Flint served with the fast carriers as they struck targets in support of the invasion of Luzon. She continued in this role during the Iwo Jima landing and attacks against the Japanese home islands. Flint also was involved with the prolonged fight for Okinawa, screening fleet units and providing shore bombardment.

In July and August, 1945 Flint joined the Third Fleet in strikes against targets in Japan and briefly remained in the area to support initial occupation efforts. In October, Flint left the area to participate in Operation "Magic Carpet", to bring home war veterans from the Pacific. While with the USS Flint Lieutenant Fisher was promoted to LCDR.

May of 1946 found LCDR Fisher joining USS Nevada BB-36 as Navigator. Nevada was too old for retention in the post war fleet and was assigned in July to serve as a target during the atomic bomb tests at Bikini in the Marshall Islands. After two bomb test failed to sink the USS Nevada she was towed to sea in August and sunk by gun fire and torpedos.

LCDR Fisher was then assigned to the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis in September, 1946, as an Electrical Engineering Instructor. After a three-year assignment at the Naval Academy, LCDR Fisher received orders to report to USS Charles H. Roan DD-853 as her Executive Officer.

LCDR Fisher, reported to Commander Deragon, Captain of the Charles H. Roan at that time. Commander Deragon was relieved by Commander Martineau in November, 1949. In November of 1950 Roan was involved in a collision with the USS Brownson while operating in fleet maneuvers under black out conditions 200 miles off the coast of Bermuda. Five crew members were killed and 3 injured. Roan was towed to Bermuda for temporary

repairs and then to Boston for repairs at the Charlestown Navy shipyards.

In January, 1951 Commander Martineau left the Charles H. Roan and LCDR Fisher assumed command. In July 1951 LCDR Fisher was promoted to Commander. After repairs Roan underwent refresher training at Gitmo and then resumed normal operations along the east coast.

In May, 1952 Commander Fisher left the Roan to assume duties at BuPers in Washington, DC until November, 1955 at which time Commander Fisher was transferred to ComPhibPac in the Hawaiian Islands where he was the Force CIC Officer.

Commander Fishers next assignment kept him in the Pacific, this time in Korea. In April, 1958 he was assigned to the Naval Advisory Group, Chinhae Detachment as OinC. The responsibilities of the Naval Advisory Group at this instillation were primarily logistics.

Returning to the United States in June of 1959, Commander Fisher assumed duties as the Executive Officer at the Naval Ordinance Plant in Louisville, KY also serving for a time as Acting Commanding Officer until his retirement in July 1963.

Willis Fisher went on to pursue a career with **Jefferson** the County board of Education his until retirement there. Willis Fisher passed away Louisville, KY in April, 2003 at the age of 85. He left behind his wife of 60



years, June Davis Fisher, a son and daughter and five grandchildren.

Commander Fisher served in the United States Navy for 22 years, with 12 of those years being sea and foreign duty. Commander Fisher was authorized to wear the Navy Unit Citation, American Defense Medal, WW2 Victory Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal with 8 battle stars and the China Service Medal.

I'm sure that it took Henry a long time and a lot of effort to track down our shipmates and, to Henry, thank you. Going on a couple of more pages and Henry has gathered more shipmates into the Association. Again, many familiar names that served back In the early '60's and another good job by Henry.

I am attaching a photo of the brass RPM indicator that used to be attached to the engine order telegraph of the Roan prior to her entering the FRAM program. Do we have a museum I could donate it to? I wonder how many of the folks reading this today polished it with good old Brasso? I know I did.

I am enclosing a check for \$50.00 and ask that you send me a license plate holder and put the rest in the fund. As always, thanks to all of you who make this newsletter, the web site, and the organization in



She also said that she, had recently found the Roan site for her father on the computer and he was looking forward to joining. To get back to the original thought. We just received this e-mail:

Hello: I am the sister-in-law of Leland Eugene Smith who served on the USS Roan. While a family member was working on Ancestry.com, your website came up. Leland was called up from the naval reserves in 1950 and was one of the navy men killed during maneuvers between Norfolk and Bermuda. We did not know many details about his death and your article about the tragic accident was certainly interesting. Leland had been married only six weeks and was twenty-two years old when he was called to duty.
